## Detailed description of the project

Following two ministerial meetings on tropical deforestation, held in Paris in March 2010 The REDD+ Partnership did not and still does not purport to be a "forum for negotiations" and in Oslo in May 2010, the REDD+ Partnership was launched to accelerate the rise of bis" outside of the Climate Convention. However, the Partnership issues are as important REDD+ actions and financing, by improving efficiency, transparency and coordination of as those of UN negotiations on REDD+, because it is a space dedicated solely to REDD+ and initiatives on the ground. ## Services provided
